





Music Notes from Ray Urwin

We'll be singing a new Offertory hymn, published in a hymnal supplement, today and for the next few weeks. I named the tune in honor of our late bishop Frederick Borsch; I believe these words speak to issues he deeply cared about and would have greatly identified with, and hope they do with you as well. This hymn is one of several I have written to this author's poems; more about her in a future Music Note.

Coronations, weddings, and funerals of British monarchs are always momentous occasions, including musically, going back at least as far as Handel's famed *Coronation Anthems* for George II in 1727 (one of which, *Zadok the Priest*, has been sung at every coronation since, and is probably Handel's most performed choral piece outside of *Messiah*). Elizabeth II's coronation in 1953 was no exception - it was one of the most significant events in 20th century church music. The "usual suspects" of traditional Anglican church music were well represented, but in keeping with tradition new music was commissioned as well, with Ralph Vaughan Williams (four pieces in the ceremony!), Herbert Howells, William Walton (1902-1983) and others contributing music for the occasion. Commissioning some new music will likely be true as well for the coronation of Charles III, a cellist and classical music lover. Today's prelude is from *Orb and Sceptre*, one of the preludes for the ceremony, commissioned from William Walton, who had also written music for her father's coronation in 1937.

Elizabeth's piano teacher was Sir William Harris, longtime Organist at St. George's Chapel at Windsor and composer of today's Communion anthem, written to words by a clergy colleague for the St. George's choir. Harris gave piano lessons to both Elizabeth and her sister Margaret and even wrote some piano duets for them; he also wrote a choral piece for the coronation. The Queen will be buried in the Chapel, by coincidence just steps away from Harris' tomb.

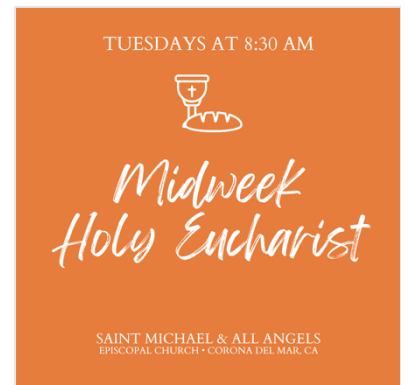

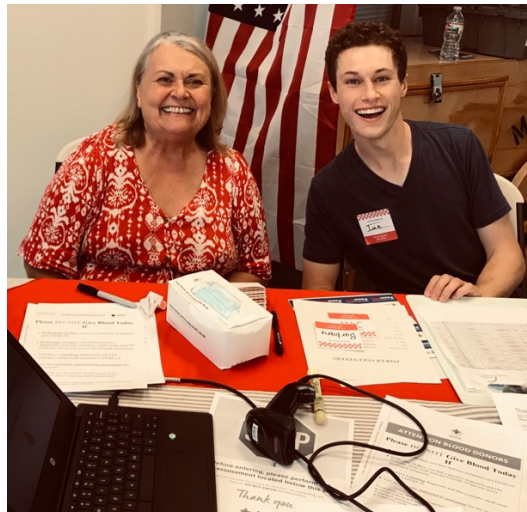
