Today at St. Mike's:

Music Notes from Ray Urwin

Today's Prelude and Communion music are settings by teacher and student of today's Hymn of Praise, a major Lutheran Advent hymn. Although Bach studied with at least one other major teacher, one of his major influences in both composing and performing was Dietrich Buxtehude, renowned organist (and church treasurer) at the Marienkirche in Lübeck, in northern Germany. This post, in a free Imperial city gave him considerable latitude in his musical career, and his autonomy thee was a model for the careers of later Baroque masters such as Handel and Telemann. His series of evening performances known as *Abendmusik* attracted musicians from diverse places and remained a feature of the church from 1673 to 1810. In 1703, Handel traveled to Lübeck and met Buxtehude, who was by then elderly and ready to retire. He offered his position to Handel but stipulated that the organist who accepted it must also marry his eldest daughter (a common practice and tradition at that time, so not unreasonable). But both Handel and another composer turned the offer down and left the day after their arrival! Two years later, J.S. Bach, then a young man of twenty, walked to Lübeck, a distance of more than 400 kilometres (250 mi), and stayed nearly three months to hear the Abendmusik, meet the preeminent Lübeck organist, and hear him play. He overstayed his sabbatical leave time, and his employer threw him into jail when he returned late (they later reconciled)! Though he wrote other more extended music (often notated in lute tablature, but that's another story), Buxtehude's setting of this hymn (today's Prelude) is somewhat bare-bones and simple, with a florid, melismatic ornamentation of the hymn melody, and a basic accompaniment. Bach's setting (Communion), written in final form in the final decade of his life, is similar in format and texture, but much more florid and melismatic even in the accompaniment. Both settings end with a melismatic coda, or post-hymn extension. Buxtehude's setting is excellent; Bach's is one of his greatest pieces—a musical masterpiece and a sublime meditation on the coming of the Son of God to humanity.

The text of today's anthem is macaronic - in two languages. Many old European carols were macaronic—one language in the vernacular, the other in Latin, the lingua franca of the time. We also sing a metrical setting of today's psalm, Psalm 146.




