Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

So Abram went, as the Lord had told him; and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he departed from Haran. Abram took his wife Sarai and his brother's son Lot, and all the possessions that they had gathered, and the persons whom they had acquired in Haran; and they set forth to go to the land of Canaan. Reader A Reading from Paul's letter to the Church in Rome.

¹³The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.


Music Notes from Ray Urwin

Today is the final Sunday of our Choir for this season. Please convey your thanks and appreciation directly to the choir members: Sopranos Christina Alexopoulos-Smith (section leader), Michele Dulson, and Susan Zevnik; Altos Mary Bailey (section leader), Pat Albers, and the Rev. Dr. Barbara Stewart; Tenors Vincent Loza (section leader) and Richard Zevnik; and Bass Scott Ziemann (section leader and bass section). Well done, one and all!

Today's organ voluntaries and final hymn were composed by Herbert Howells, a famous English composer known best for his large output of Anglican church music, and beloved of choirs and organists. The prelude is from the first of two sets of three Psalm Preludes, pieces depicting specific psalm verses, each set written either just before or during each World War. The hymn found on page 14 (665 in the blue Hymnal 1982) is one of the great hymns of the previous century; Howells later recalled that he dashed off the music as soon as he received and read through the text, while opening the rest of his mail at breakfast (one of at least three hymns in our book that I know were written very quickly)! He named the hymn tune *Michael* for their nine year old son, who died suddenly from polio and whose death affected virtually all the rest of Howells' music. My descant for the hymn was written following a music conference, and the organ part briefly quotes the beginning of the melody of Howells' most famous anthem. The closing voluntary was among several pieces found in Howells' papers after his death in 1983. Howells was a long-time and revered faculty member at the Royal College of Music, England's Juilliard. In January 1972 I was in England as a college student, and bluffed my way into the College around lunch time, hoping to meet him. I found his office and waited, but when he returned from lunch I didn't have the courage to speak up and introduce myself.


