Italian Pipers' Song

Dating from the 15th century, this is one of the oldest and best-known Italian carols. Probably Sicilian in origin, this popular tune was spread throughout the mountains of central Italy by shepherds who came into the villages for the Christmas Mass, playing bagpipes and peasant instruments along the way. Handel spent some of his youth in Italy, and later adapted this tune for "He shall feed his flock" in Messiah, and it inspired many Christmas instrumental pieces by Corelli and other Italian composers.

This anthem text may be found at Hymn 87 (this evening's processional hymn). Written in 1739, these words been sung to a number of different tunes, even including "Jesus Christ is risen today!" The familiar tune, originally from a secular chorus composed by Mendelssohn in 1840, was first put with the words in 1855. This tune by an anonymous 18th century composer, was originally likely a solo or duet, and predates the familiar hymn tune by 86 years.

Stille Nacht (original version) Franz Gruber (1787-1863), arranged by Richard Proulx (1937-2010)

This beloved carol was written and first sung at a midnight Mass on Christmas Eve 1818, probably with only guitar accompaniment, since the organ had broken down. Franz Gruber, the organist, set the words of the assistant priest, Joseph Mohr (1792-1848), on the day of Christmas Eve, making a simple, folklike, and quintessentially Austrian cradle song and dance, including folk elements such as yodels and horn calls - an accidental and last-minute yet perfect marriage of words and music. You'll hear that the original melody was a little different from what we now sing, and the last line repeats. This arrangement is close to the original, the manuscript of which is now in possession by the famous von Trapp family.

IN THOSE DAYS a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

"Glory to God in the highest heaven,

and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

Sermon

A period of meditative silence follows the Sermon. All then stand. The Nicene Creed, the ancient summary of the Christian faith, is recited by all in unison.

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the 🖶 resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.







You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.
