

Music Notes by Ray Urwin

The melody of today's last hymn is attributed to John Francis Wade (c. 1710-1786), an English Roman Catholic who, following a tradition going back to at least the 16th century, spent most of his life on the Continent, in his case France. He worked as a music copyist and singing teacher, and left a manuscript. There are no composers or authors listed in it, and it is thought that he wrote the melody for today's hymn, but both the original Latin text and the tune for the other one, *O come, all ye faithful*.
