¹When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. ²For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. ³And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. ⁴My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, ⁵so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

⁶Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. ⁷But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. ⁸None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. ⁹But, as it is written,

"What no eye has seen, nor ear heard,

nor the human heart conceived,

what God has prepared for those who love him"—

¹⁰these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. ¹¹For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? 
The Great Thanksgiving



It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

Because in the mystery of the Word made flesh, you have caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give the knowledge of your glory in the face of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.





Music Notes by Ray Urwin

Today's organ music was composed by Heinrich Scheidemann (1596-1663), the bestknown composer for the organ in north Germany in the early to mid-17th century, and an important forerunner of both Buxtehude and Bach. He was organist of the Catharinenkirche in Hamburg (possibly the largest organ in the world at that time) for more than 30 years. Through his teachers and students he is part of a direct musical line to Bach, from the late 16th century to the mid-18th. Scheidemann wrote almost entirely organ music, and was renowned as both organ performer and composer, as evidenced by the wide distribution of his works; more organ music by him survives than by any other composer of that time. His lasting contribution to organ literature was his imaginative settings of chorales, including a new invention, the *chorale fantasia*, which would "treat each phrase of a chorale differently, thus becoming large, sectional compositions with elaborate development of the chorale melody. [Wikipedia]." These pieces also used the full resources of the developing German Baroque organ. Today's prelude is part of a chorale fantasia on an Epiphany hymn tune. I'm playing today's Communion piece for hands only on 4-foot stops, which sound an octave higher than played. I'll also be using the Zimbelstern ("cymbal star"), a high-pitched percussion stop giving a tinkling sound, akin to a glass wind chime. Though it is not on our organ, on some organs the Zimbelstern is mounted on the outside of the case, thus visible, shaped like a star, and turning when played, delighting children!

Today's anthem by Handel, from an early Passion setting, can be seen as his version of Bach's "Jesu, joy of man's desiring" in terms of its form: a simple, basic hymn tune, with each phrase separated by instrumental interludes. Like the Bach, it's a setting of a Lutheran hymn tune, much used by Bach but very rarely used by Handel.

Next Sunday, February 12, we will be joined by one of our Christmas Eve violinists, who will play music with the choir, congregation, and organ.
