



<sup>19</sup>So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. 


### The Great Thanksgiving



It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

Because in the mystery of the Word made flesh, you have caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give the knowledge of your glory in the face of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with Michael and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.

If you prefer not to have wine, simply cross your arms over your chest after receiving the wafer.

Gluten-free wafers are available: just ask the priest when you come forward to the altar rail.







### Music Notes by Ray Urwin

Part of an important family of both clergy and musicians, today's offertory anthem composer is Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810-1876). Named for Johann Sebastian Bach, he is considered the greatest composer of English cathedral music since Henry Purcell (d. 1695) and was the greatest English organist of his day. Wesley served as organist at Hereford, Exeter, Winchester, and Gloucester cathedrals and various London churches, and was a prolific composer of important choral and congregational music, with seven hymns in our hymnal (including The Church's one foundation).

A Jesuit friend once told me that a Pope is also the Bishop of Rome, and so gets two cathedrals: St. John Lateran for the Archdiocese of Rome, and St. Peter's Basilica for the worldwide Catholic Church. Today's Communion music is the best-known motet by Palestrina, choirmaster of both cathedrals and one of the greatest composers of the late Renaissance. And our Voluntary is one of Bach's greatest chorale-based pieces, using a tune which was a metrical setting of the Nicene Creed; the solidly striding pedal part probably indicates the steady, firm doctrines of the Creed.

Finally, today we sing a different hymn verse at the Presentation; more about this striking text's author, and the composer, in a future Music Note.
