Please remember St Michael's in your prayers and we hope you will return to worship with us again!



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



¹Since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, ²through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. ³And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, ⁴and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, ⁵and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

⁶For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. ⁷Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. ⁸But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us. ⁹Much more surely then, now that we have been justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath of God. ¹⁰For if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life. ¹¹But more than that, we even boast in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

⁵Jesus came to a Samaritan city called Sychar, near the plot of ground that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. ⁶Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired out by his journey, was sitting by the well. It was about noon.

⁷A Samaritan woman came to draw water, and Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." ⁸(His disciples had gone to the city to buy food.) ⁹The Samaritan woman said to him, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" (Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans.) ¹⁰Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." ¹¹The woman said to him, "Sir, you have no bucket, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? ¹²Are you greater than our ancestor Jacob, who gave us the well, and with his sons and his flocks drank from it?" ¹³Jesus said to her, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, ¹⁴but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The

water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." ¹⁵The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water."

16 Jesus said to her, "Go, call your husband, and come back." 17 The woman answered him, "I have no husband." Jesus said to her, "You are right in saying, 'I have no husband'; 18 for you have had five husbands, and the one you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true!" 19 The woman said to him, "Sir, I see that you are a prophet. 20 Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain, but you say that the place where people must worship is in Jerusalem." 21 Jesus said to her, "Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. 22 You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. 23 But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship him. 24 God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth." 25 The woman said to him, "I know that Messiah is coming" (who is called Christ). "When he comes, he will proclaim all things to us." 26 Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one who is speaking to you."

²⁷Just then his disciples came. They were astonished that he was speaking with a woman, but no one said, "What do you want?" or, "Why are you speaking with her?" ²⁸Then the woman left her water jar and went back to the city. She said to the people, ²⁹"Come and see a man who told me everything I have ever done! He cannot be the Messiah, can he?" ³⁰They left the city and were on their way to him.

³¹Meanwhile the disciples were urging him, "Rabbi, eat something." ³²But he said to them, "I have food to eat that you do not know about." ³³So the disciples said to one another, "Surely no one has brought him something to eat?" ³⁴Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of him who sent me and to complete his work. ³⁵Do you not say, 'Four months more, then comes the harvest'? But I tell you, look around you, and see how the fields are ripe for harvesting. ³⁶The reaper is already receiving wages and is gathering fruit for eternal life, so that sower and reaper may rejoice together. ³⁷For here the saying holds true, 'One sows and another reaps.' ³⁸I sent you to reap that for which you did not labor. Others have labored, and you have entered into their labor."

³⁹Many Samaritans from that city believed in him because of the woman's testimony, "He told me everything I have ever done." ⁴⁰So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. ⁴¹And many more believed because of his word. ⁴²They said to the woman, "It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the Savior of the world."








Worship and praise belong to you, maker of light and darkness.





Music Notes by Ray Urwin

Today's organ music is based on a tune to a versification by Martin Luther of the Lord's Prayer. The preludes are by Bach; the postlude by Georg Böhm is a beautiful and quiet meditation on the tune, and one of his most beautiful pieces. Böhm (d. 1733) was organist for many years of the principal church of Lüneburg in northern Germany, St. John's Church. While there is no direct evidence, he must have at least met and probably tutored a teenage Sebastian Bach, who arrived in 1700 and studied for two years at the Michaelisschule, a school associated with St. Michael's church. It would have been politically difficult for a student at St. Michael's to study with the organist of St. John's because the churches' choirs (and presumably their directors) were "not on good terms!" While there's no direct evidence that Bach studied with him, it's extremely likely that he did, perhaps even carving his initials on Böhm's organ console at St. John's! One of Bach's sons claimed to his first biographer that Sebastian loved and studied Böhm's music, and the earliest known manuscripts copied by Bach, discovered in 2006, included a copy of a famous piece and signed "Il Fine â Dom. Georg: Böhme descriptum ao. 1700 Lunaburgi". The "Dom." may suggest either "domus" (house) or "Dominus" (master or teacher), but in any case it's clear that Bach knew Böhm personally, if unofficially. Their connection became a close friendship that lasted many years, and Böhm even served as a regional selling agent for some of Bach's music many years later. Besides being a highly likely teacher of the young Bach, he is known today primarily for his own keyboard music. He composed with instrumental flexibility in mind: much of his music can be successfully played on organ, harpsichord, or even clavichord. Today's voluntary, however, requires two different keyboards with different sounds, as well as the pedals, so is definitely for the organ.

The Communion motet is a famous piece by Josquin des Pres, less known today but acknowledged in his own time and by colleagues and even rivals as the greatest composer of the mid-Renaissance. He is the first Western composer to be highly regarded for many years after his death. Like Bach's carving his initials, Josquin also seems to have left physical evidence of his presence: during restorations on the Sistine Chapel in the 1990s the name "Josquin" was uncovered (along with many other names) on a wall in the Chapel's choir gallery. One musicologist has written that while it's not a real autograph, for various reasons the chances that Josquin actually wrote it are very high, as he sang in the papal choir in the late 15th century.
